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Human Trafficking in Kent County

Does human trafficking exist in Kent County? Yes. Wherever there are people, streets, hotels, and businesses, there is human trafficking. Trafficking does not mean smuggling people across borders; it means selling people as commodities, most often for forced sex or labor. It is a crime to cause anyone to engage in labor by force, fraud, or coercion; or to prostitute anyone under age 18, whether by force or not. Traffickers gain control over victims through intimidation, false romance, violence, money, drugs, and threats. They often manipulate victims into believing that the trafficker is the only one who can provide for them, or that if victims break loyalty with the trafficker, they or someone they love will be seriously harmed. If you see anyone you think is being forced to perform sex or labor against their will, even if the person denies it, call the police to report it immediately.

The Kent County Human Trafficking Task Force is developing a community of ready responders to be the eyes and ears of human trafficking in Kent County. We call on parents, teachers, teens, hotel clerks, gas station workers, waiters, police officers, prosecutors, nonprofits, medical professionals, and community members to recognize the signs of sex and labor trafficking and report it.

This guide is a collection of area resources to help those affected by trafficking, from basic needs like food and shelter to legal help and prosecution. Basic Needs

Shelter

A safe shelter program for youth who are facing homelessness or considering running away. The Bridge offers youth a stable and accessible place to stay. Along with a variety of supportive programs, it helps them connect with peers, learn new skills, and find resources to reconnect with their families, schools and community. The Bridge services are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and 365 days a year to youth (ages 10-17, male and female). Youth/families in crisis can call or walk in anytime. Services are free.

Also provides a resource office, ID office, and mailing addresses.

Open Door is a safe haven for women in crisis. Women are provided with a place to sleep, access to showers and lockers and the opportunity to be part of support groups.

Please have the following information available to complete an assessment: last 4 digits of Social Security Number for all household members, documentation of homelessness. HAP is open weekdays from 8:30-noon and 1:00pm-4:30pm. Walk-in hours are Wednesday from 11-3pm.

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security is responsible for investigating human trafficking, arresting traffickers and protecting victims. The department uses a victim-centered approach. It also processes immigration relief through Continued Presence (CP), T visas, and U visas to victims of human trafficking. Red Flags of Human Trafficking

Frequently seen with young people who are vulnerable to sex trafficking:

- “Dates” someone much older. Gets lots of gifts from that person. Has to check in with them often.
- Their picture is posted on Backpage or other adult sites
- Engages in sexual activity to have basic needs met: food, shelter, clothing
- Kicked out by family or run away from home due to complicated family dynamics
- Carries around hotel room keys

Other red flags:

- Fake ID’s and/or no ID
- Truancy
- Lying about age
- Substance abuse
- Poor medical history
- Stunted growth
- Malnutrition
- Rotting teeth
- Multiple pregnancies
- STDs
- Consistent need for pregnancy tests
- Broken bones
- Multiple abortions
- Fertility/reproductive health issues
- Branding
- Tattooing (specifically of a trafficker’s name)

Common work and living conditions:

- Is not free to leave or come and go as he/she wishes
- Is in the commercial sex industry and has a pimp / manager
- Is unpaid, paid very little, or paid only through tips

- Works excessively long and/or unusual hours
- Is not allowed breaks or suffers under unusual restrictions at work
- Owes a large debt and is unable to pay it off
- Was recruited through false promises concerning the nature and conditions of his/her work
- High security measures exist in the work and/or living locations (e.g. opaque windows, boarded up windows, bars on windows, barbed wire, security cameras, etc.)

Poor Mental Health or Abnormal Behavior:

- Is fearful, anxious, depressed, submissive, tense, or nervous/paranoid
- Exhibits unusually fearful or anxious behavior after bringing up law enforcement
- Avoids eye contact

Lack of control:

- Has few or no personal possessions
- Is not in control of his/her own money, no financial records, or bank account
- Is not in control of his/her own identification documents (ID or passport)
- Is not allowed or able to speak for themselves (a third party may insist on being present and/or translating)

Other:

- Claims of just visiting and inability to clarify where he/she is staying/address
- Lack of knowledge of whereabouts and/or of what city he/she is in
- Loss of sense of time
- Has numerous inconsistencies in his/her story
